Key Findings

District 10 has the largest number of homeless students in any City school district at around 10,300 students. The district has 630 family shelter units, including hotels and cluster sites (the fifth-highest number citywide), and ranks second for the number of students in shelter at 2,600 with another 7,000 homeless students living doubled up.


