Key Findings

There is just one family shelter located in the district with 120 shelter units, but over 1,500 homeless students attend school in District 18, including 580 students living in shelter.

The graduation rate for homeless students living in shelter in District 18 is roughly as high as the rate for their housed, low income and non-low-income peers. (62%, 63%, and 60%)





Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.
