Key Findings

Homeless students in District 19 have the highest rate of late identification of special education needs (IEPs) in the city at 78%. This was 25 percent higher than the rate for housed, non-low-income students in the district. (58%)

District 19 has improved the chronic absenteeism, mid-year transfer, and suspension rates over the last six years for homeless students who were living both in shelter and doubled up.


