Key Findings

Roughly 2,750 doubled-up homeless students and 165 students in shelter attended District 20 schools. These District 20 students scored proficient at higher rates than doubled-up and sheltered students citywide.

Students in shelter attending District 20 schools were suspended at a rate of 9.0%, compared to 2.5% citywide.

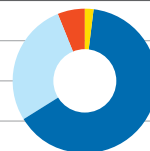

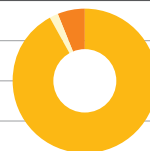

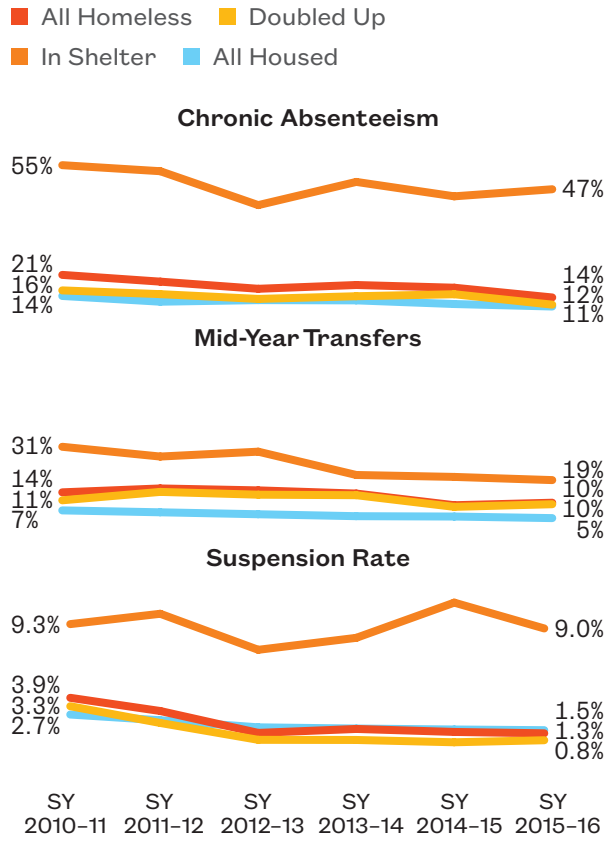

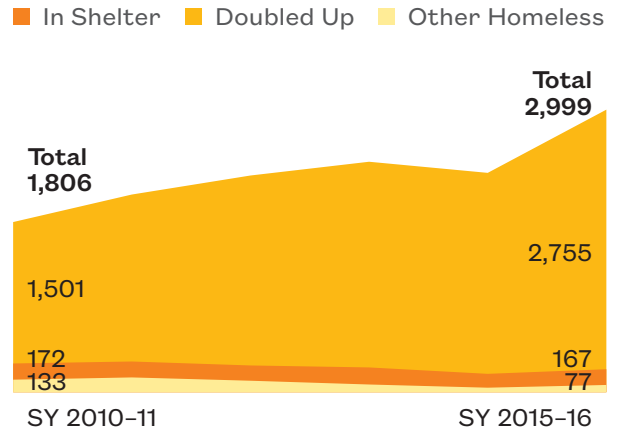

Some shelters are not included due to missing or incomplete address information. See User's Guide for further notes about the family shelters included in this publication. The number of homeless students represents where students attend school; homeless students may attend schools in districts where they do not live. Ratio of elementary students who will experience homelessness by fifth grade is an estimate based on trends over the last six years; due to growing student homelessness, this is likely an underestimate. Students who experienced homelessness in the last six years is the ratio of currently homeless and formerly homeless students to the total number of students in the district. Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.

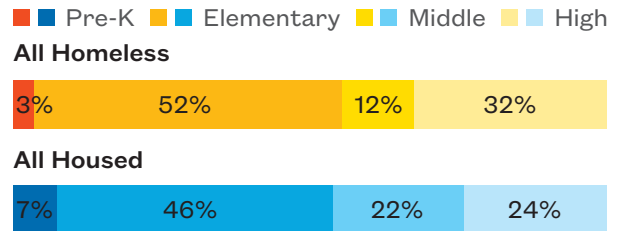
Changes in Educational Outcomes



Homeless Students in District 20 Public Schools



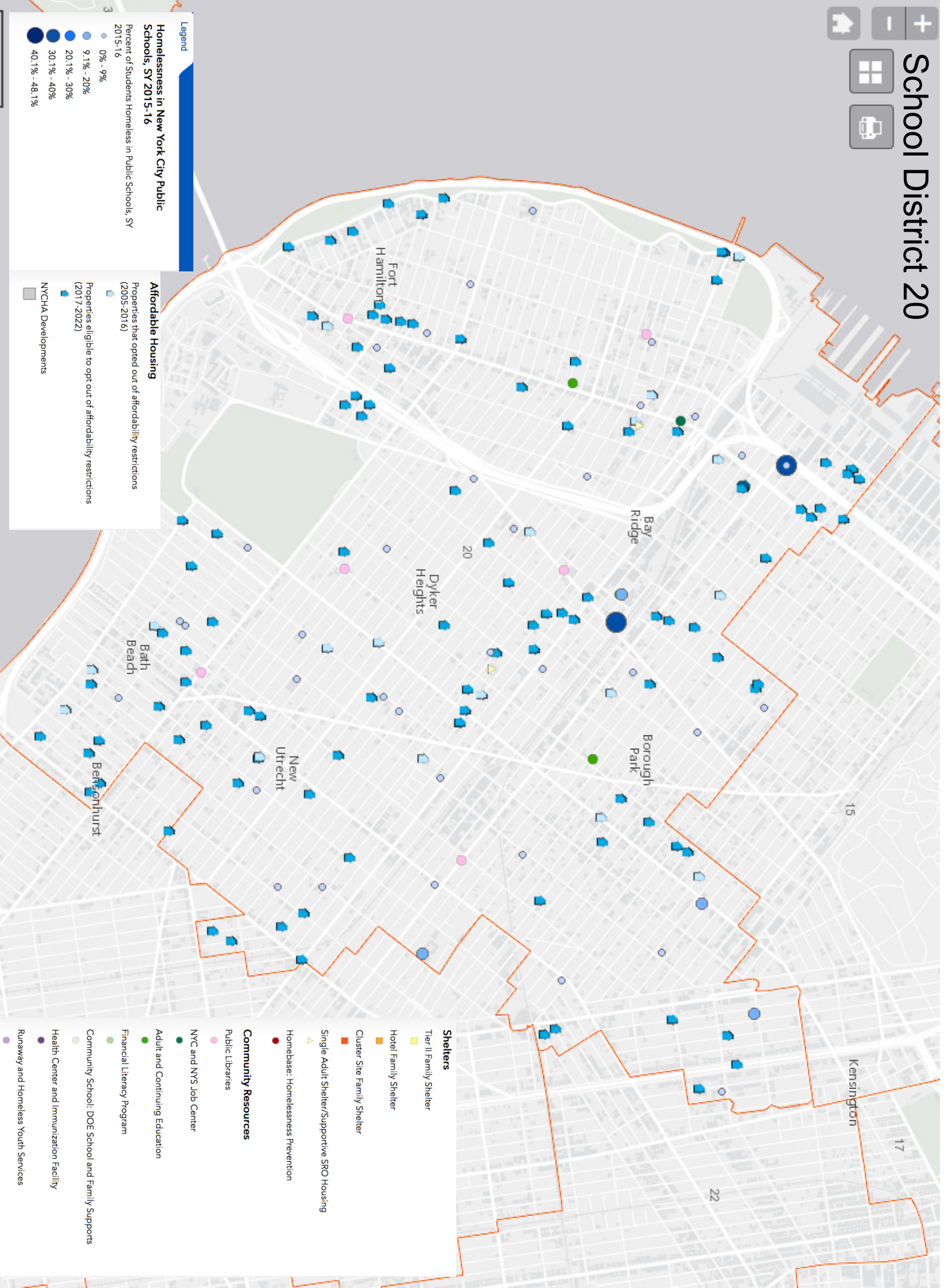
