Key Findings

There are no family shelter units in the district, but the number of homeless students attending school in District 25 has more than doubled during the six-year period, reaching over 1,700 in SY 2015–16.

District 25 students in shelter were at a high risk of suspension: 10.8% received a suspension in SY 2015–16 compared to less than 2% of their housed classmates and homeless peers living doubled up.






