Key Findings

The number of homeless students attending District 26 schools more than doubled in the previous six school years, from 388 students in SY 2010–11 to 823 students in SY 2015–16.

Close to half of homeless students in the district are in high school, with homeless students dropping out at over twice the rate of both low-income and non-low-income housed students. (9%, 4%, and 4%)


