## Key Findings

Nearly 4,000 homeless students attended school in District 6 in SY 2015-16. This represents $16 \%$ of all students, with another 6\% formerly homeless.

Although mid-year transfer rates among students in shelter declined by 10 points over the six-year period, chronic absenteeism persists at twice the rate of housed students and homeless students overall. (47\%, 19\%, and 24\%)
