There is only one shelter on Staten Island and over 2,700 homeless students attending school in the district, with 1,700 of those students living doubled up.





Key Findings

Over half of students experiencing homelessness in District 75 schools live in shelter. (59%)

A persistently wide gap in mid-year transfers exists between all groups of homeless students in District 75 and housed students, with 37% and 39% of doubled-up students and students living in shelter transferring mid-year in SY 2015–16 compared to 17% of housed students.

Homeless students are chronically absent at a rate three times that of all students citywide. (62% and 20%) The rate is even greater among homeless students living in shelter. (69%)



Key Findings

A high percentage (37%) of homeless students in District 79 live in an "other" non-shelter homeless setting, such as a hotel/motel that involves payment.

Chronic absenteeism rates among District 79 students remain persistently high. The rate for all homeless students attending district schools is nearly three times the citywide rate (58% and 20%), but the chronic absenteeism rate jumps to 75% for homeless students in shelter. Even housed students in the district face absenteeism challenges, with 73% of low-income students and 60% of non-low-income housed students chronically absent.

Nearly two-thirds of District 79 students experiencing homelessness transferred mid-year, seven times the citywide average. (62% to 9%) Students living in shelters saw even higher mid-year transfer rates, with more than three-fourths of students transferring mid-year. (79%)


