Key Findings

Over half of students experiencing homelessness in District 75 schools live in shelter. (59%)

A persistently wide gap in mid-year transfers exists between all groups of homeless students in District 75 and housed students, with 37% and 39% of doubled-up students and students living in shelter transferring mid-year in SY 2015–16 compared to 17% of housed students.

Homeless students are chronically absent at a rate three times that of all students citywide. (62% and 20%) The rate is even greater among homeless students living in shelter. (69%)

Elementary Students Experienced Homelessness by 5th Grade








Where Homeless Students Sleep

Some shelters are not included due to missing or incomplete address information. See User's Guide for further notes about the family shelters included in this publication. The number of homeless students represents where students attend school; homeless students may attend schools in districts where they do not live. Ratio of elementary students who will experience homelessness by fifth grade is an estimate based on trends over the last six years; due to growing student homelessness, this is likely an underestimate. Students who experienced homelessness in the last six years is the ratio of currently homeless and formerly homeless students to the total number of students in the district. Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter. Some categories are not shown for District 75 due to lack of reporting.
