


Students Who Were Homeless During High School Were over 2x as Likely to Drop out of School



Nearly **two-thirds** of students who were **homeless** during high school were **chronically absent** during at least one of these years.




These students were over **2X** as likely to **transfer schools** mid-year as housed students.



When homeless high school students are able to avoid the disruption of chronic absenteeism or mid-year transfers, they have a 90% graduation rate, well above the citywide average of 74%.

Homeless high school students were over **1.5X** as likely to be suspended as their classmates.



Suspensions among homeless students, who already face high rates of absenteeism, can cause them to become further disengaged in the schooling process and increase their likelihood of dropping out.

Nearly **1** in **6** homeless students **dropped out** of high school prior to graduation.



Only **56%** of students who were ever **homeless** in high school **graduated on time** with their classmates, compared to **77%** of students who were always housed during those years.

For homeless students, failing to complete their education limits their access to future opportunities and hinders their ability to break the cycle of housing instability.
