

Homeless Middle Schoolers Are 2x as Likely to Be Suspended as Their Classmates




Students who exprienced homelessness were suspended at almost **2X** the rate of housed students.




Homeless students account for 9% of middle schoolers but 14% of middle school suspensions.

Homeless middle school students who are suspended are about 4x more likely to drop out of school than their classmates who are not suspended.




Those who were **homeless** were over **2X** as likely to be **chronically absent**... ...and over **3X** as likely to **transfer schools** mid-year as housed students.



When homeless students are able to attend school regularly, they are less likely to fall behind in their learning and more likely to perform at grade-level on annual exams.

Homeless students were half as likely to score proficient in math and English Language Arts, compared to housed students.



Middle school proficiency is a strong predictor of high school graduation. Nearly all homeless students (94%) who scored proficient on both their math and ELA exams in eighth grade graduated on time with their class.
